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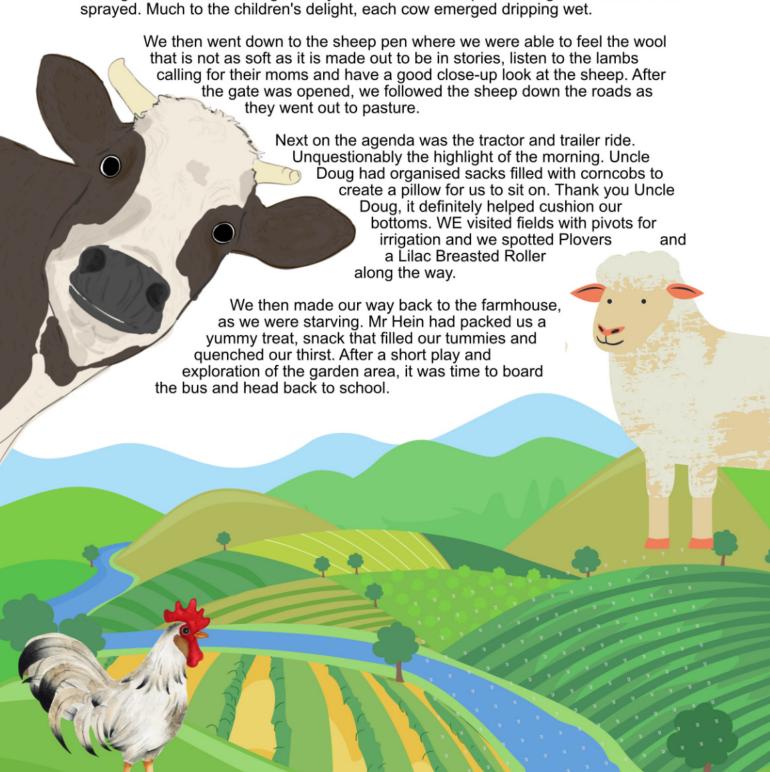




Outing to Cluny Farm

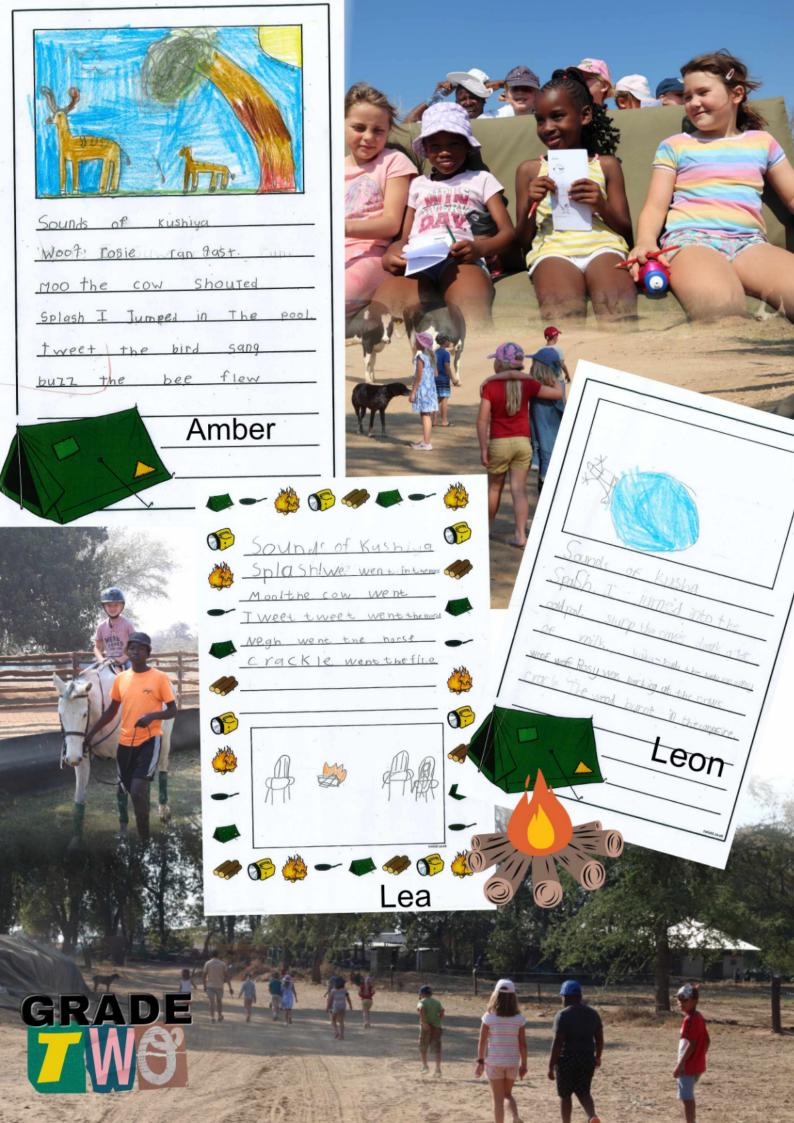








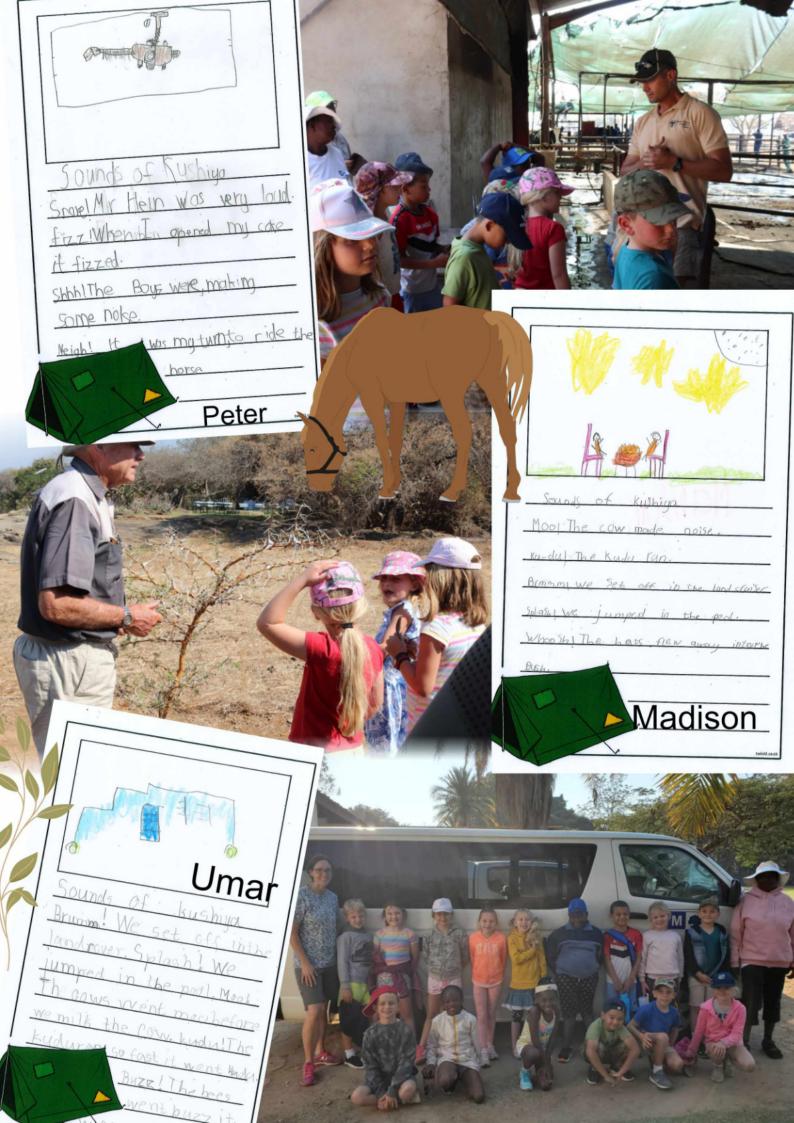














Outing to the Wildlife Discovery Centre & Elephant Orphange

A bus full of excited and eager children was collected from school by Game Rangers International and we made the short trip to the park to start our morning of discovery.

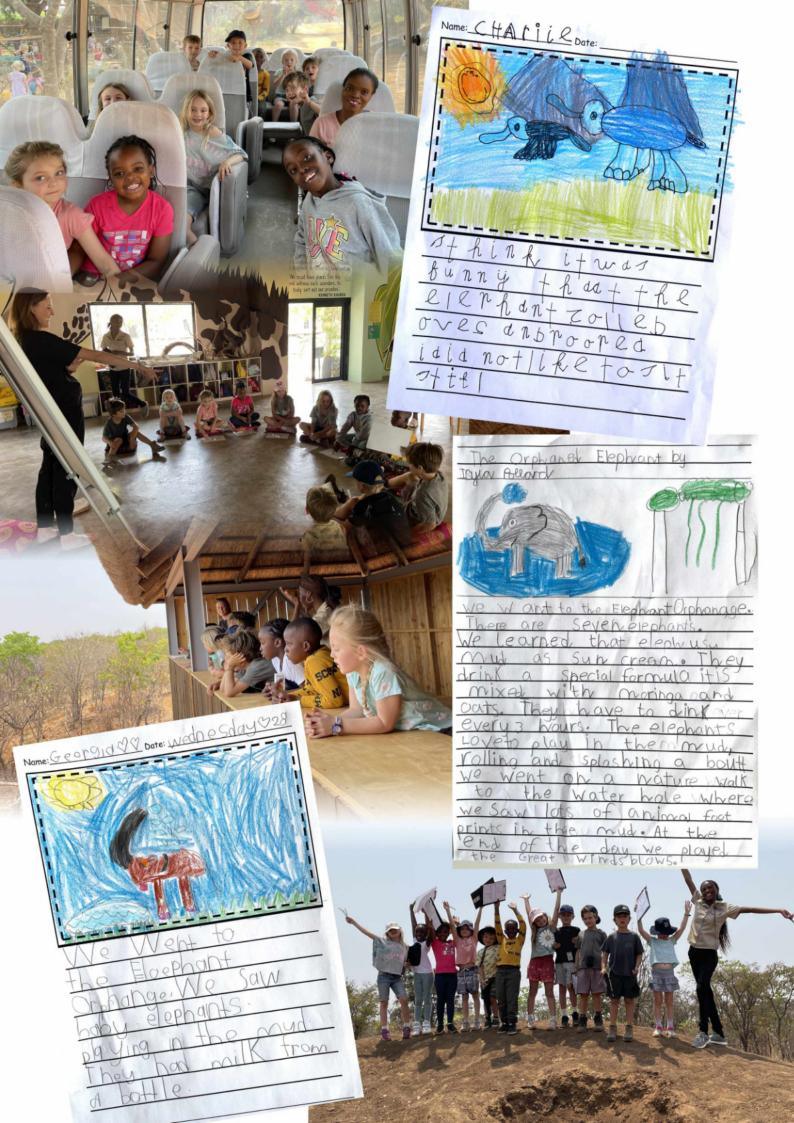
The new purpose-built centre has the most inviting Exploratorium which immediately drew the children in, and they soon set about discovering all the wonders on offer. From giraffe leg bones to porcupine quills, chongololo exoskeletons to mukwa pods – the list is endless! The children were kept busy with numerous activities, all teaching about different animals and habitats found in Zambia. They had to make lists of animals and design their own animal with special adaptations they could choose. There were lots of hands-on learning opportunities and practical learning tools, such as the tower made from snares – giving us an authentic platform to discuss poaching.

After a mid-morning snack, we donned our hats and set off for a bush walk to the waterhole – inspecting and learning to identify different animal droppings and spoor. We were detectives around the water hole, observing different insects coming for a drink and identifying the animals who had recently been for a drink by reading their tracks in the mud.

The highlight of the morning came at the end when we watched the seven orphaned elephants who are being cared for by GRI, having their lunch-time milk followed by a wallow and a frolic in the muddy waterhole. The class were enthralled by this experience and keenly watched the elephants going about their business in the enclosure, before heading out into the bush to forage for the afternoon.

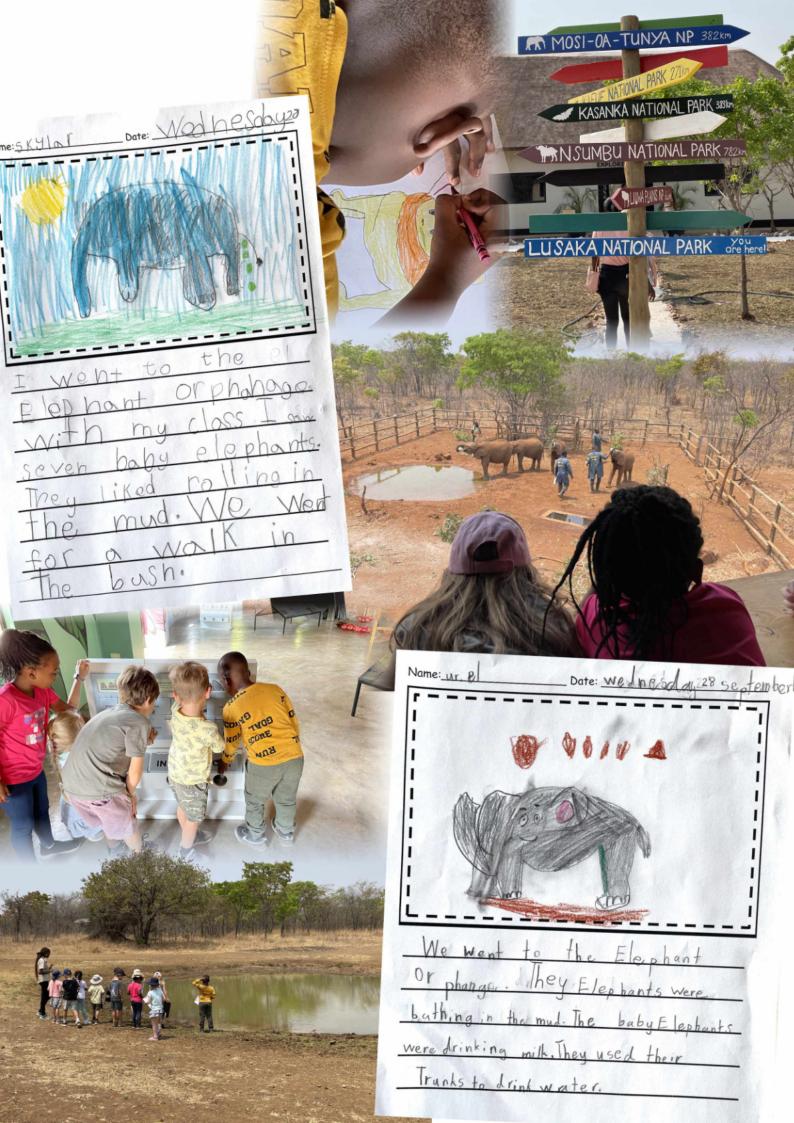

The children went on a bush walk after a 40 minute boat ride while viewing animals like waterbuck, impala, crocodiles and hippos. They learned about other animal species like the double-life style Mayfly, asking insightful questions to gain varied perspectives.

Catching healthy worms for fishing, using their locally made fishing rods was the highlight of the camp. Each child caught a fish, with a few lucky ones catching up to as many as 30 in one session! Being a crocodile farm, children were given a chance to pick fresh crocodile eggs while the mothers looked on, which they took to the incubator.

Thank you to Mr and Mrs Jordaan for sharing your home with the children and for teaching them so much. Thank you too, to Siena for adding to the fun around the swimming pool with her infectious smile. Thanks to Mr Katele and our reliable driver Derick for safety on the busy Maamba road. After they put the fish on a tractor, they freeze the fish and sell it to customers from everywhere. They had to empty the whole pond and it estimated that there was about 60,000 fish in one pond! Imagine! From 9 ponds; 60 000 x 9 = 540,000 fish. From this trip I learned how to put the net in the water and pull it out of the water. It was an amazing experience.

I was very sad to leave but I have made lots of memories and had so much fun thank you teachers!!!

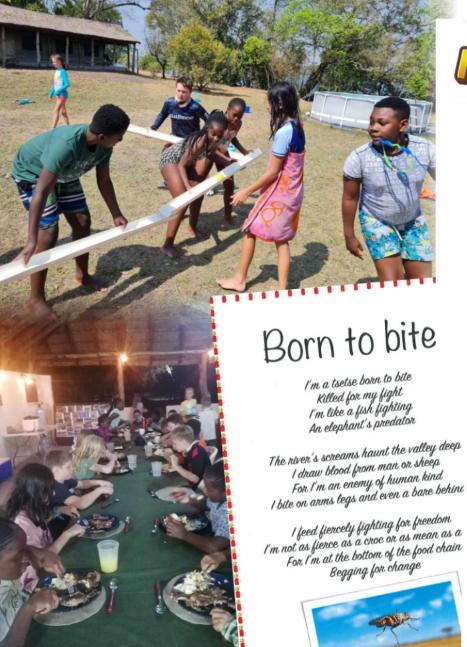

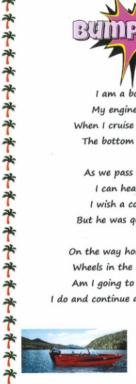

Sadly, after four fun days we had to leave, to come back to school. Luckily mapunga had packed lunches for us. We packed the bus and departed. It was an awesome, amazing



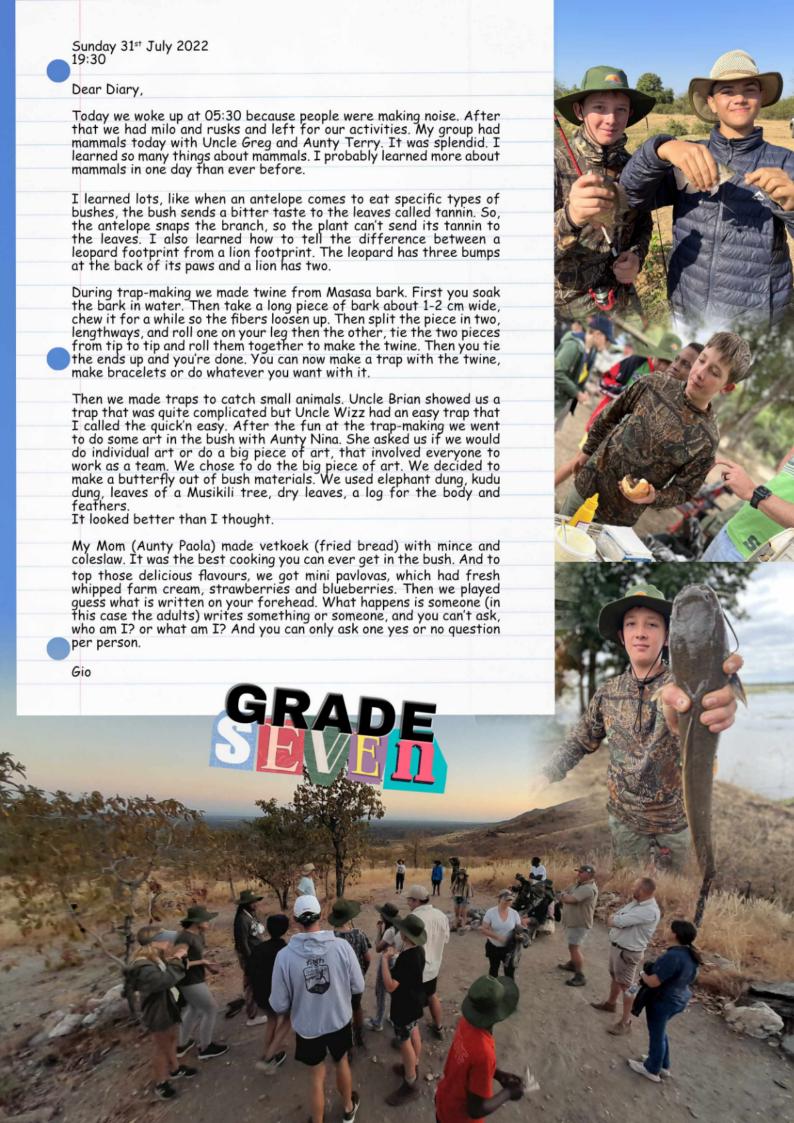
